The Pastor's Page

In mid-March, I spent three days in Seattle at the NEXT church gathering of the Presbyterian Church (USA). This event brings people together from across the country to participate in worship, listen to speakers, and attend workshops dealing with various concerns as we discern how God is calling the church into the future. According to the organization's website, NEXT Church is a network of church leaders who believe the church of the future will be more relational, more diverse, more collaborative, more hopeful and more agile. It is a movement seeking to strengthen the relational fabric of the PC(USA) so that our congregations are strong and healthy enough to be a sustained, effective, faithful and moral voice that is engaged in the transformation of our communities toward the common good.

What I most appreciated about the gathering was that NEXT church sought to embody this self-description. Instead of just talking about diversity, the NEXT church leadership made a commitment to being at least 50% minority and they held themselves to that, so that the leadership board is a vibrant mix of races and genders and backgrounds. The keynote speakers included a Native American mission worker, an African-American church leader, and a white lesbian Baptist sociologist. During the closing worship service, three women of color stood at the communion table, celebrating the sacrament. That image spoke more powerfully than any slogans about diversity ever could.

Instead of just talking about an agile church, the conference modeled agility, adjusting to meet needs as they occurred, such as when food ran out for lunches on the first day of the event! We heard from the pastor of First Presbyterian Church in Seattle, where the gathering was held, about how their congregation is finding new ways to do ministry in a building which used to hold 500 people that now finds fewer than 40 in worship - half of

the facility is currently used as transitional housing for those seeking to escape homelessness, while the long-term plan is to sell the building and use the funds to develop sustainable ministry.

I share the hope that NEXT Church proclaims that the future of the church will be "more relational, more diverse, more collaborative, more hopeful and more agile." I long for that church to come to fruition, and I saw a glimpse of it at this gathering. I also glimpse it on many Sundays at Immanuel, when I look out over a congregation of young and old, black and white, gay and straight, and everything in between, all worshipping God together. I pray that as a congregation, we can find ways such as making use of the resources offered by NEXT church - to be an "effective, faithful and moral voice that is engaged in the transformation of our community" for the good of God's world.

Hello all we are having some fun things for the youth this year. This year is triennial Presbyterian Youth Triennium and we have two youth from our church going this summer. As a result there will be at least two fund raising events.

On Easter Sunday April 21 David Weaver is leading the planning for a donation brunch to help raise money. So please bring an appetite and I hope you donate generously. Then on Sunday May 19th there will be a Wash-as-you-Worship. Myself and the youth will be washing the cars in our parking lot for donations to support the youth going. Also there are Triennium bonds for sale. The idea is that you fill out a dona-

tion form and then when the youth are at Triennium they will send postcards or texts to everyone who bought bonds.

I also attended the winter meeting of the Yukon Presbytery. The main focus was on stewardship of our planet. Both in taking better care of the world given to us, as well as our neighbors. I am happy to report that every church in our Presbytery is going green in their own way.

The Intergenerational Arctic Ministries or I AM has started the next step of the listening way program now that they are fully funded. They will begin by people in three different villages on the north slope to help and counsel people in

need that reside in their communities. The goal is that by the end of the year there will be counselors in 10 villages and that the counselors will be able meet up 4 times a year to compare and express concerns. This would be done in the hope of finding solutions that will work in their situations.

The Presbytery of the Yukon also voted and agreed to write a letter to Governor Dunleavy about his proposed budget, as well as write a different letter to politicians down in the capital.

By the end of the meeting we still had a several thing to still vote on, so as a result there is to be a teleconference on May 30th to finish up the meeting.

NEEDED: Presbytery Support

The Presbytery of Yukon consists of 21 churches throughout Alaska. Its boundaries are from Barrow in the north to Anchorage in the south, from Kaktovik in the east to Gambell in the west. Just as funds are required to keep each church operating it takes funds to keep the Presbytery operating. Every church used to contribute to two funds in support of the Presbytery as well as PCUSA nationally. Those contributions were in the form of Presbytery Fair Share and Per Capita. The amounts contributed to these two different funds were determined by the

number of voting members a church had and other methodologies. About two years ago our Presbytery decided it was in its best interest to combine these two funds, thus becoming Presbytery Support. Immanuel has figured its share of Presbytery Support is about \$90.00 per member. We ask that those of you who are members prayerfully consider contributing to Immanuel's share of Presbytery Support, again \$90.00. If you are not a voting member of Immanuel we still urge you to contribute to this fund and help us offset Immanuel's budgeted contribution to this fund. Any and all amounts would be very gratefully appreciated. In

addition to offsetting the general operating expenses of the Presbytery such as the salary of the Executive Presbyter and administrative support, some of these funds go towards supporting the following activities of our Presbytery.

- Gambell new church building
- Heating oil for villages such as Kaktovik, Savoonga, Gambell, Wainwright
- The Permanent Endowment mission Fund
- Anchorage Native Fellowship
- Commissioned lay pastor training and continuing education
- Travel costs to and from the villages
- General Operating

- future activities of members will also be outlined.
- * On 4/6, Rob Hagan, a representative of the Presbyterian Foundation will be offering two workshops in Wasilla, which are relevant to the Planned Giving Navigator (see reports of earlier meetings). Rozann Kimpton intends to attend these workshops.
