The Pastor's Page

"Our service of worship has ended. Our worship through service now begins."

I have seen or heard this statement at the close of worship services in various congregations, either printed in the bulletin or spoken aloud as part of the liturgy. I appreciate it because it both emphasizes the importance of not limiting our service to God to what happens within the sanctuary on Sunday morning but also highlights the importance of worship for preparing us to go out into the world.

Worship is central to our identity as Christians and it is certainly central to our life as a congregation. Worship is the time we set aside to gather with our brothers and sisters of faith, to sing and pray together, to listen to God's Word, and to renew ourselves spiritually. Without that regular experience of worship, it is hard to maintain our connection to God. Without frequent prayer and exploration of God's Word, it is hard to maintain the energy,

courage, and hope needed to live faithfully, to love our neighbors, and to shine the light of Christ into what is often a dark world. And without gathering together on a regular basis, it is hard to maintain our connection to one another as the body of Christ. Thus as a congregation, it is essential for us to regularly gather for worship.

But as the quote above indicates, it is also important that we do not stop with worship. Worship grounds us, inspires us, and energizes us so that we can go into the world with the faith, courage, wisdom, and energy that we need to do God's work. And there is much work to do. Our national government is currently considering taking away the ability for millions of people to access affordable health care. On the local level, we face a ballot initiative that seeks to remove equal rights for

some residents of our city. Many people, especially the most vulnerable among us - the poor, the sick, the elderly, the marginalized - feel stressed and afraid. There is great need for people of faith to advocate for justice and work for healing, in our nation and in our community. There is great need for words (and acts) of hope and love in order to counteract fear and hostility. Worshipping together is important, but so is living out our faith in the public realm.

Immanuel has an impressive history of living out its faith in visible and often courageous ways. May we continue that tradition of faithful service, both in and out of the sanctuary.
