The Pastor's Page

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Our Easter declaration still rings through the air and through our hearts. Easter Sunday may be over, but the celebration continues as we move through this Eastertide season, culminating in the festival of Pentecost on May 15.

The good news of Easter is more than the remembrance of a one-time event that happened long ago in a faraway land. The good news of Easter is the promise that God in Christ is more powerful than death, that love will eventually triumph over hate, that joy comes after sorrow, and that new life is always possible.

In many parts of the world, this season is filled with reminders of resurrection and the promise of new life. Buds are appearing on trees, flowers are shooting up from the ground, grass is starting to turn green once again. Because we had an early Easter this year, and be-

cause we live in Alaska, such signs of new life in nature are not yet present for most of us. But neither are they far off. Before the Easter season ends, we too will have the joy of watching buds pop out and seeing green shoots appear from the ground.

But nature is not the only setting in which we can be reminded of resurrection. I see numerous signs of new life here at Immanuel – increasing participation in adult forum, new energy in worship, the

"resurrection" of the choir, the wonderful (perhaps record high?) attendance at our Maundy Thursday potluck and communion service, the festive atmosphere of our post-worship lunches,

visitors who show interest in learning more about our community, and dedicated, energetic Deacons and Elders who are committed to building up this community of faith and to seeking new ways of serving Christ.

We are Easter people. We not only proclaim the resurrection of Christ, but - in the words of the Nicene Creed - we also "look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come." I give thanks for the resurrection and new life that I see here at Immanuel, and I hope you will join with me in celebrating and enjoying it together.

A Colorful Year

The liturgical color during the Easter season is white. On 5/15 it is red to signify Pentecost. On 5/16 it becomes **green** for "Ordinary Time" and remains green until Advent begins in November when it turns to **purple**.

White is used for special days or

seasons signifying the redemptive work of Jesus Christ.

Purple marks seasons of penitence and preparation such as Advent and Lent.

Blue can also be used for Advent

Gray signifies bareness; usually when the church is stripped of color at the end of

the Maundy Thursday service and remains "bare" until Easter. Sometimes **black** or **deep scarlet** is used.

Red is used for Pentecost (and often for ordination services).

Green is used most of the year during "Ordinary Time."

In 2009 we moved from Norfolk, VA to Anchorage. As a Presbyterian I was looking for a church close to where we lived. While driving around we found Immanuel Presbyterian Church. I have been attending Immanuel. I have served as Deacon from March 2013 to January 2016 and on January 24 I was ordained Ruling Elder. I love Immanuel because it feels like Home to me.

Tuesday at 4 pm, there will be an ice cream social. All ladies giving milk come early.





Per Capita at Work

Per capita funding is how Presbyterians mutually share the costs of coming together to discern the Spirit's leading for the future. It is how Presbyterians are trained to become better elders and ministers; discern God's call in their lives; participate in the life of the wider church by serving on General Assembly committees and commissions; and how Presbyterians participate in the life of the Church universal as we commit ourselves to work and live in fellowship with "all persons in every nation" (Book of Order, G-4.0101).

Per capita is what pays for the costs of Presbytery leaders and representatives to attend the biennial General Assembly at virtually no cost to their respective Presbyteries. The Ruling Elder representative to the 2016 General Assembly in Portland, OR in July will be our very own Sara Johnston.

All congregations are required to pay their Per Capita share annually. The amount is based on membership. Immanuel's Per Capita cost to the Presbytery of the Yukon (& PCUSA) is almost \$2000. As such our individual Per Capita amount is \$47.10. We graciously ask that you consider paying your Per Capita or as much as you are able. Envelopes have been distributed at worship and /or are included in the mailing of The Caller. We thank you for your generosity!
